

Art as an Investment



Modern art or UK Equity Income? What better time to look at art as an investment than today, just after the record busting sale of a Mark Rothko painting.

Artsy.net reported 64% of the art collectors cited potential return on investment as a significant factor when acquiring Art. An effective investment requires thorough planning and careful choice. Art might not be the first choice for an investment however, according to the AMR Art 100 Index, Art prices have increased overall at a compound annual growth rate of 8.0% over the past 25 years.

The global Art market is flourishing, according to The European Fine Art Foundation (TEFAF) Annual Market Report, the most comprehensive summary of the art market. In 2016 it reached total sales of \$63.8bn. The UK performed as the largest art market in Europe and the second largest in the world. Reaching the total of \$13.5bn closely followed by China, which has seen a 23% decline since 2014.

Although the UK market experienced a slight fall, analytics call the slowdown inevitable as the sales had recently reached a higher level during the last ten years. One of the related factors that has emerged recently, and which investors find disconserting: Brexit. Several experts published in New York Times predict fewer high-end pieces will come to the market in the UK, stating that "No one is going to be selling much in the UK now because sterling is so low." However, history proves art is a valuable asset, even during hard times. "When financial markets are in turmoil, the art market offers a safe harbor," said Christophe Van de Weghe, a Madison Avenue dealer.





Telegraph Money recently advised investors, to buy art that everyone else is buying. Post-war and Contemporary art take the lead in the sales. Along with Traditional Chinese and Modern Art, they are regarded as the most desirable. Bloomberg reports , auction sales of these works have grown from \$260 million in 1995 to \$7.8 billion in 2014. Although until the UK renegotiates the trade arragememnts with the European Union, the high end art market stands in uncertainty than smaller markets.

What to Consider When Buying Art

Alan Bamberger, in his speech originally given to an audience of art collectors at the Indianapolis Art Center, asks the question.

Imagine a situation when you want to buy a new car: depending on how expensive the purchase is, the more careful the inspecting process is. A car, for instance, has to be test- driven. When buying, art or a car, its best to act based on a thorough decision.

Begin by going through a selection of the artist's art, either firsthand, in print, or online – a great selection of our artists' works are available on our website. Ask a specialist to explain all the details such as labels, sides, edges, and signatures. It will give you an insight into what the art is about.

Find out if the piece is original or reproduced by mechanical means – a signed print, for instance. Assuming the art you're interested in is original, find out whether it's "major" or "minor,". The majors, more complex and labourintensive works, tend to be more valuable.

Determine whether the art you like is "typical" or "atypical" – the former are the artworks collectors tend to buy, whilst the latter are created using different techniques or mediums, making them unusual, one-of-a-kind, but not well known.

Operating in the Art Market

When a market is about imagery, you'd expect the quality of the image to be the key factor in driving prices. However, other factors play a major part – good artby itself doesn't guarantee market success.

Auction results

When price records tumble in the amphitheatre of an auction room the media love it. Usually there's a story combining wealth (of the buyer) and fame (of the artist) which journalists love. That's if you're buying big name artists with a track record on the secondary markets. However, many emerging and mid-career artists won't have an auction track record. Often primary sales of their work are in original ownership so while any auction results will give a measure of an artist's standing, it's always worth looking for evidence of price movement in other art market indicators.

Gallery Representation

Galleries play an important role. When an artist has a long-term relationship with a leading gallery it's a sure sign that the artist has considerable merit. If the gallery is prepared to give a solo exhibition to an artist, that's a real mark of confidence. The internet is your friend – most galleries will devote web space to their top sellers, giving you biographic and art history detail.


Art Fairs and Biennales

The art fair is a growth industry in its own right. A fair gives buyers a single venue where they can see a wide range of work in a multitude of genres. For the artist it provides exposure to a much bigger audience, often an audience that would otherwise be unfamiliar with their work. Most of the higher profile galleries and auction houses will have booths at art fairs and play their part by inviting their established customers to attend. Biennales are non-selling contemporary exhibitions usually arranged in national pavilions. They feature artists that can be expected to attract a large, affluent following. Although you can't buy at a Biennale, they can put you on the track of an artist and let you research buying opportunities for their work.

Press and Media

Coverage of artists in specialist art magazines, newspaper columns, radio and television programmes, and also respected online blogs and publications do a lot to raise the profile and the price of an artist. Media attention has lifted the profile of artists like Grayson Perry and Tracey Emin to the benefitt of the early buyers of their work.

Books and Journals

When an artist has gained a level of recognition among peers and the public, they will often feature in art reference books or have magazine editions dedicated to their work. These are key milestones and often function as a springboard for their prices. Sales Auction results give obvious clues as to sales and values of an artist's work, but these are secondary market indicators. Even on the primary market it's possible to determine whether there is price- boosting demand.

Lack of availability of work


Solo or joint shows where red dots (the industry equivalent of an estate agent's sold sign) predominate, a waiting list for commissions, and representation in respected galleries are all great signs.

Art Prizes

It seems that corporations with money to spare in their marketing budgets like the kudos of being associated with art; hence the proliferation of art competitions. When an artist wins – or is short-listed– for a prize it shines a spotlight on them and their work and can boost their prices both in primary and secondary markets. A prize won stays on the artist's CV for a long period, and has a lasting affect on their investment potential.

Being Selected

Public galleries and museums are keen to acquire and show work that they consider of significance. The same is true of major private collectors. If an artist's work is sought out by a curator from an important collection then that's a good guarantee that an artist's work has great investment potential.





Tips From the Top

Insurance

Works of art above a certain limit have to be declared individually on household or commercial insurance. Your regular insurer will cover them, but their fees may be excessive compared to a specialist art insurer. We'll advise, and seek quotes.

Framing



Valuations

Essential for insurance and sometimes for estate and tax administration we can provide certified art valuations from expert valuers.

Shipping and transport

Most works are, to a greater or lesser degree, fragile. A common cause of damage is transport. Those who swathe a work in bubblewrap and move it in the car boot can find themselves faced with substantial repair costs. For any work, the answer is to get a proper transit case made. For higher value works it's sensible to have it moved by specialist, experienced (and insured) art shippers. We always work with the same Art Carries as they are consistently excelent.



Hanging

Where and how you hang art brings out the aesthetic value and helps protect the investment value of your work. We are happy to advise clients on professional art hangers and hanging systems.

Cleaning and Repair

Like it or not, art does collect atmospheric dirt and grime and can sometimes get damaged. The answer is professional conservation. We know specialists in all types of cleaning and repair on all surfaces and with all sorts of materials.

Every trade and profession has its own jargon, and art is no exception. If you don't know impasto from intaglio, read on.

Acrylic:

A rival to oil paint, coloured pigmentisheldinaclearplasticsolution. It provides bright, long-lasting colour.

Board:

A more modern substrate, board is heavy card with a smooth or embossed surface. A descrition of a work might, for example, say 'acrylic on board'.

Canvas:

The classic substrate for painting, canvas is a heavy fabric stretched over a wooden frame – a stretcher.

Catalogue Raisonné:

A comprehensive, annotated listing of all the known works by an artist either in a particular medium or all media. The works are described in a way that lets them be reliably identified by a third party.

Collagraph:

A hand printing technique using many separate printing plates to provide limited editions with the visual appeal of an original painting.

Condition:

You'd expect a primary market purchase to be in perfect or 'mint' condition. An artwork that has

led a hard life might well be 'poor', 'damaged', 'dirty', 'crazed', 'creased', 'deteriorated', 'aked', etc.

Conservation:

A skilled technique to repair damage and deterioration.

Diptych:

A painting consisting of two panels, each complete in itself, but complementary when displayed next to its partner.

Etching:

A printing process resulting, usually, a work with a limited colour range.

Gesso:

A white paint consisting of a binder and a pigment such as chalk or gypsum. Gesso is used to prepare a surface which will later be painted over with the funished work.

Gouache:

A thick, heavily pigmented water- based paint.

Impasto:

The application of paint so thickly that it stands out in relief from the substrate.



Intaglio. A portfolio word covering techniques printing like drypoint, etching, engraving, where ink is pressed into marks on the printing plate, the ink then transferring to paper as the plate and paper pass through a press.

Limited Edition. A print made in a limited quantity, each identified with an edition number so that, say, 14/25 would be the 14th print of an edition of 25. After the edition has been completed the printing plates are destroyed.

Medium. A word describing the way an image is put onto a surface, such as oil, acrylic, pastel, watercolour, collage, etc.

Oil. A paint type where pigments are mixed in an oil, often linseed. Oil paint dries slowly and some art techniques exploit this to build up mixed and layered colours within the work.

Proof. When prints are made, the first off are 'proofs' which let the artist or printmaker examine them in detail to see whether any amendments are needed.

Provenance. A very important concept in the secondary market, 'provenance' is the record or records that let the work be traced back to its primary market introduction. Without adequate provenance it is difficult for a work to be accepted as de nitely by a particular artist.

Resale Rights. When a work is sold on the secondary market for €1000 or more, the original artist may be entitled to a royalty on the sale. The royalty is calculated on a sliding scale that peaks at 4%.

Triptych. A work consisting of three panels. Often they are hinged, with the two outer panels forming 'doors' over the central panel, thus providing some protection when not on view. The outside of a triptych may also be decorated, but usually not as elaborately as the inside.

Watercolour. A solid or paste-like paint that is thinned with water before being painted, usually onto paper or board.
